Double Parking

PLEASE DON'T DOUBLE PARK WHILE DROPPING OFF OR PICKING UP YOUR CHILDREN!!!!!!!!!.

I don't know how to make it any clearer. It is only some people that are certainly putting our children at risk. To all the parents doing the right thing, I thank you. Please ring the City of Casey Council and notify the bylaws office of anyone who is double parking and putting the safety of our students at risk.

Anaphylaxis Safety Measures



Currently at Chalcot Lodge we have four students who suffer anaphylactic reactions: These students are in Foundation, Year 4 and Year 6. These students suffer severe, rapidly progressive allergic reactions to certain foods and factors in the environment that can potentially be life threatening.

All four students have an extreme allergic reaction to nuts and one student is also allergic to eggs and coconut. **EpiPens** are required for these students when an allergic reaction occurs.

In light of these serious conditions, formal Management Plans have been developed for each student and staff have been trained on how to respond in an emergency situation.

Unfortunately, whilst some foods are obviously nut based, such as Peanut Butter and Nutella, many other foods also contain traces of nuts. It is for this reason that we are urging the school community to assist us in keeping these four students safe from harm by reinforcing the message to your own children that, under no circumstances should food be shared or swapped with any other children at school. We strongly urge parents of children in 5/6P, 3/4T, 3/4K and Prep CB to refrain from sending nuts or nut products such as Peanut Butter, Nutella & nut confectionary products to school (including seafood in 3/4T).

Every day counts

School is better when you're here Attendance fact sheet for primary school students

Do I have to go to school?

Yes, in Victoria everyone aged from 6 - 17 has to go to school.

Missing one day a fortnight is the same as missing 4 whole weeks of school a year. From prep to Year 12 that adds up to 1.5 years of school!

School is better when you attend. Your friends and your teachers notice that you're away and wonder if you're OK.

Why is regular attendance at school important?

Right now, being at school is the most important thing you need to do for your future. School helps you build good habits for later on in life. You might think school is just about Maths and English but you're also learning about how to work with other people and how to solve problems.

Being at school every day also means you are becoming more independent as a learner and interacting with your friends and teachers. If you're at school you can get help from your teachers and friends and won't have to try to learn things in your own time.

Being an adult probably seems far away but we know that young people who attend school more frequently have better outcomes after school too. This means they earn more money, have better job opportunities and are generally healthier. So being at school really does make a difference!

Do my parents need to let the school know if I'm going to be away?

Yes. Your parents need to notify the school by 10.00am the morning of your absence.

If you're away from school too much and don't have a reasonable excuse like a serious illness, your parents can also get in trouble.

Are there any good reasons to be away from school?

No. Unless you are so sick you can't get out of bed or there is an event like a funeral, you should be at school. Every day you are away is a day of classes and social connection you miss out on. Taking a day off for your birthday or go shopping isn't a good reason to miss school.

Even medical and health appointments should be made either before or after school or during the school holidays. This includes family holidays. Your parents are encouraged not to plan holidays during the term but to organise these during the school holidays.

If you do have to be away for some reason, your parents need to contact the school and let them know what's going on. Depending on the situation, the school might provide schoolwork for you to complete.

What do I miss out on if I'm not at school?

You miss out on all the big stuff – class discussions and all the interaction that happens in a classroom, the chance to get help from teachers and the opportunity to practice skills and gain knowledge. Being away means you might miss out on a lot of learning or that you need to catch up in your time. If all of that isn't enough to convince you to be at school every day, being away also means you also miss out on playing with your friends. Being away from school a lot can be lonely. It has a big impact on relationships and social connections. Believe it or not, everyone wants you at school and it really is better when you attend.

What if I'm having problems getting to school?

Getting to school on time everyday can be about having a good routine. If you find yourself running late or missing school because you're disorganised, try:

Asking your parents for help getting ready

Having a set time to go to bed

Leaving all technology out of your bedroom

Packing your school bag the night before with everything you need

Having a set time for breakfast

Planning to meet up with a friend so you can travel to school together.

Sometimes though it can just be hard to go to school. You might feel overwhelmed by the work or things might be tough with your friends. Whatever the situation is, staying away from school isn't the answer.

There are lots of people who want to help. Try talking to:

Your parents or another adult family member

A trusted teacher

Wellbeing Coordinator

School Crossing Safety

There are over 70 Schools in the City of Casey, serviced by over 240 school crossing supervisors. Over 35,000 students attend these schools each day, travelling by foot, private vehicles and public transport.

The City of Casey encourages drivers, parents and others responsible for children, to carefully read the information below to minimise the risk of accident or injury at and around school crossings.

Why are school crossings important?

Children do no have a well developed sense of danger. They also do not have well developed peripheral (side) vision or spatial sense. This makes it difficult for them to properly judge the safe time to cross a road. Supervised school crossings were formally introduced in the 1970s to protect children from this risk.

Why do we need parking and traffic controls around school crossings?

Crossing supervisors need to have a clear field of vision in all directions around their crossing, so that they can spot approaching children and vehicles as soon as possible.

Because children are often very small, cars parked or stopped too close to crossings can completely obscure them from the view of supervisors and drivers. Coupled with children's limited ability to identify danger, this can create a very hazardous situation.

Parents and other people who are dropping off/picking up children also need reasonable access to parking for that purpose.

What sorts of controls can I expect to find around schools?

A range of restrictions may apply according to the needs of the particular area. The following restrictions may apply at and around your school:

No stopping



What does no stopping mean?

No stopping means you cannot stop your vehicle for any purposes, no matter how short the time.



No parking



What does no parking mean?

No parking means that the area is a pick up/drop off zone and that you cannot leave your vehicle un-attended and you cannot be parked for more than 2 minutes.

Bus Zone




What does bus zone mean?

Bus zone means that this area is for buses only. You cannot stop there at all.

Disabled Parking



What does disabled parking mean?



As a driver what am I required to do around school crossings?

When approaching school crossings, slow down to 40km/h or less, watch for children and remember not to stop too close to the crossing. You MUST stop before the STOP LINE marked on the road once the stop sign is displayed to you

The crossing must be completely vacated of all pedestrians before proceeding, including the supervisor

Also watch for, and obey, the instructions of the School Crossing Supervisor.

Look for parking restriction signs and make sure to obey them or you may be fined
